Tournament of Champion WSC in Yale University

Debaters have come home triumphant from the Tournament of Champions (ToC) for the World Scholar's Cup (WSC) in Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut, USA last November 18-21. They competed against almost 800 champion scholars from 20 countries around the world.

The NHS contingent won several awards and emerged as the top 1 group from Indonesia. The junior team of Allison Suhendra, Geoffrey Budiman and Caitlyn Limanto (Secondary 4) won Top 10 Team Overall from the Junior division. They were also Top 6 for Bowl and Top 12 for Challenge. The junior team of Benedict Sutedja and Annisa Chen (Secondary 3) was top 14 for challenge while senior team of Samantha Hartono, Alleen Indra and Dave Tirtariyadi was top 19 for challenge. They competed against more than 200 teams.

As for individual awards, Dave Tirtariyadi won top 3 for Social Studies Challenge while Kenneth Liyanto (Secondary 3) won top 9 for Science Challenge. Both are the top scholars for NH for their respective divisions.

WSC participants compete in four events namely: Scholar's Bowl, Scholar's Challenge, Team Debate and Collaborative Writing. They have to study a syllabus with a common theme spanning six subjects namely Science, History, Social Studies, Literature, Art and Music and Special Area. They were trained by English Teacher, Ms. Mara Barbra Nanaman and Ms. Archielan Labalan.

IPEK, Energy and Electricity Museum

Physics is a field of science that encourages discovery and experimentation and any Physics teacher would endorse the benefits of field-based experiences. Enhancement of higher-order cognitive skills, refinement of observation and inquiry skills, increased self-confidence, and improvement in student attitude are all benefits cultivated during field trips.

This field trip was truly informative and quite a rewarding experience for the students. It enabled students to participate in scientific activities such as the one found in the Sound and Wave section, where they could create waves of different types. Water-rocket was another interesting demonstration, which taught them how pressure difference can be used to launch a projectile. In the static electricity section Van de Graaff generator caught the attention of many students.

In topic related to optics, there were many models explaining the various optical phenomena such as total internal reflection and refraction of light through prism. Working with hologram, laser, cinema, optical fiber, inverse square law, ordinary reflection and many other related exhibits were quite informative. Moreover a perfectly working miniature model of AC generator clearly displayed the conversion of gravitational potential energy stored in water to electrical energy.

We found out more about how electricity is generated and supplied to Jakarta from different available resources such as sunlight, rivers and petroleum. We also had the chance to see miniature robots that can perform different movements. We also had the chance to watch an animation developed locally that discusses how pollution affects our environment and what is being done to help minimise air pollution.



We were able to learn more scientific topics, ranging from electricity and sound, to light and magnetic properties. Furthermore, we experienced its application in the real world. It is great to see everyone enjoying the variety of available equipment that demonstrates different science topics. Overall, it was an enjoyable experience.
