The NHJS Debate Club World Scholar's Cup junior team of Secondary 2 students Benedict Sutedja, Hillary Yaori and Mayrra Sardjito ranked as a 11th Scholar's Bowl Team in the recently concluded Tournament of Champions held in Yale University, Connecticut, USA.

The tournament was held from November 13 to 17 and was participated in by 200 teams from 20 countries all the world. The champion teams were the best teams from the global rounds of WSC held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia last June wherein the NHJS Debate senior team of Arthur Tanjaya (Secondary 4), former student Sabrina Hartono and alumnus Kenneth Setiadi were declared best 6th team in the world among 2,700 participants from the 40 countries.

Solving the crime "The Sacrificial Cat" was the theme of this year's camp, wherein students learned some forensic science techniques such as the ability to take appropriate finger printing, and developed their problem-solving skills.

At the end of the camp, the students were able to enjoy the activities and learn at the same time. They had the opportunity to work with different people and had learned Crime Scene Investigation procedures in a real life situation.

P4 Bandung Camp

NationalHigh Jakarta School firmly believes that students' love of learning should be stimulated and nurtured thorough a wide array of activities and real life experiences such as a Learning Journey. P4 students spent two days in the capital city of Indonesia's West Java Province; the city which is set amid volcanoes and tea plantations - Bandung.

We had a head start on the journey by having a stellar experience at Bosscha Observatory where the students had the chance to see the famous 60-cm Zeiss double refractor, which is considered as the largest refractor in Southeast Asia.

After the astronomical tour the students had, we then went to Treetop Adventure Park where the kids had a blast for 2 hours. This fun and innovative tree-based activity can teach new skills in the form of balancing, strength skills, climbing and mobility skills, and mental skills by figuring out the best way to approach a new situation. This place has a fun and challenging obstacle course suspended with ropes from the tree tops. The flying foxes mixed in the course made the experience much more amazing for everyone. Children pushed their boundaries and by the end of the adventure, children themselves could say that they have achieved something great and learned something new.

The next day, the last day of the trip, everyone was up bright and early for the Saung Angklung Udjo Show. Angklung is a traditional musical instrument made of bamboo. Students were treated to a Wooden Puppet performance, several angklung performances and opportunities to have their turn to play the angklung. All participants performed a couple of familiar tunes and this interactive section was greatly appreciated by everyone.





Indonesia is such a huge country with hundreds of distinct native ethnic and linguistic groups, and the opportunity to learn, watch and enjoy professional performances of its ethnic diversity under one roof is such an experience that everyone will surely treasure.

Our next destination was the Museum Geology. This museum has brilliant pieces to hold any visitor's interest for some time. Students got to see dinosaur skeletons and other fossils. They were also amazed by the variety of rocks and granites displayed in the museum.

We then finally headed to our final stop - the Puspa IPTEK Sundial. Sundial (Sun Clock) is a set of tools used to guide local time by utilizing the sun to produce shadows of a gnomon (rods or plates where shadow is used as an indication of the time). As a Science Center, this building has a variety of equipment to explain various phenomena in the world of science and technology.

Through this very informative learning journey, our P4 students were given opportunities to experience traditional culture and the advancements in science. All participants went home with newly learned facts and newly formed ideas that they can use and develop in their classrooms.

P5-P6 Adventure Camp

The Merapi Museum

We were told to be extra careful as the tools we were handling were boiling hot and that we should avoid any contact with our skin. We saw three swimming pools: one for the Sultan's children, another for his many wives and the last one for him and his chosen wife. Only one pool still had water in it, and even that pool looked quite dirty.

Borobudur Temple

The next tour was to the Borobudur Temple. It was where all the Budha statues are located. It was in the afternoon but it wasnot that hot, so the weather was perfect for us to climb the 151 steps in order to reach the statues. Before we climbed the stairs, our tour guide held a quick briefing on the Borobudur Temple. The weather was kind of windy so the visit was quite enjoyable. The scenery from the top was really amazing. We were really glad and thankful that we decided to join the Jogja Learning Journey.











Trekking on Mount Merapi

All of us had to wake up really early the day we were scheduled to go trekking on Mt. Merapi. We were really excited. We had breakfast on the bus and reached the base camp at around 3:30 AM. We had a guide, Pak Christian, who also trekked with us so that he could explain each and every special place created by the eruptions of Mt. Merapi. Besides Pak Christian, there were also three mountain trekking experts who went trekking with us.

We were first divided into three groups, and were instructed to always walk behind our assigned guards. We started the trek at around 4:00 AM. At around 6:00 AM, we reached the sunrise point. After looking at the beautiful sunrise, we continued our track for another one hour before reaching 'the lava bed'. The lave bed was created by all the eruptions of Mt. Merapi. Together, they made a plan to trick the knight. The maids awakened the roosters, and RoroDjonggrang came to meet Bandung Bondowoso. She counted the number of statues and there were only 999, the knight became so angry that he turned the princess to the 1000th statue, which is called the RoroDjonggrang. Her statue can now be seen in the CandiPrambanan.

Secondary 4 Field Trip to Benteng Heritage Museum

On the 5th of October, the Secondary 4 students and 6 teachers visited one of the oldest buildings in the city of Tangerang: the Benteng Heritage Museum.

Students started off with the Heritage-walk after their tour guides explained the history of the Museum. Among other highlights, students visited an old market and a Chinese temple during their Heritage-walk. At the end of the informative tour, everyone was treated with a feast of Lontong Cap Go Meh, prepared by the Museum volunteers.

In the museum, students discovered beautiful stories behind various artifacts. Most items are echoes of the ethnic Chinese history in Indonesia, baring the rich tapestry of our collective past. Students also watched two videos on traditional Tionghoa wedding ceremonies and the history of the ketchup in Benteng, respectively. There was also an ivory mahjong set and other Chinese artifacts found in the vicinity of old Tangerang that showcases old Chinese techniques and different styles of batik.

One of the most impressive original elements of the house is a delicate relief surrounding the first floor reaching up toward the skylight above. The relief depicts the story of General Kwan Kong, a famous Chinese general widely revered as a paragon of loyalty and righteousness, thought to date from the 17th century.









The trip lasted for a mere 4 hours and proved to be a wonderful and educational experience for everyone. Through the visit, students deepened their knowledge and understanding of Chinese-Indonesian history and culture.

The Humanities Field Trip

On the 22nd of October, a total of 57 students from Secondary 3 to JC2 and 8 teachers visited the Bank Indonesia Museum, the Jakarta Stock Exchange, the National Museum and the ASEAN Secretariat. The trip aimed to enhance students' awareness and understanding of the key financial institutions that shape the country's financial policies, history and culture and contemporary domestic and regional challenges that confront Indonesia as well as its ASEAN allies.

They saw rare collections of bills and coins, artifacts that showed Bank Indonesia's colonial past and how it struggled to provide stability through tumultuous times as well as the booms and busts that marked the economy as they visited the Jakarta Stock Exchange.

History and Geography students were able to view the historical collection relevant to their lessons (development of human settlement in the country and colonial conditions prior to WW2) in Bank Indonesia Museum and the National Museum.

Physics is a field of science that encourages discovery and experimentation; any physics teacher would endorse the benefits of field-based experiences. Enhancement of higher-order cognitive skills, refinement of observation and inquiry skills, increased self-confidence, and improvement in student attitude are all benefits cultivated during field trips.






