Serving as a platform for students across 13 schools in Jakarta to demonstrate their talent in competitive sport and coordination, this year's event also incorporated e-sport sessions.

The games took place from 14.30 to 18.30 during weekdays and from 08.00 to 14.30 for Saturday's finals. Two locations, the multi-purpose hall and stadium, were utilised for the three competitive sports offered this year, Soccer, Basketball and Volleyball. On the other hand, e-sport was exclusively held on Saturday on the third floor.



The multi-purpose hall was packed with a fittingly explosive atmosphere suited to the high-intensity basketball and volleyball games. Benches lined the sides of the court, each packed with enthusiastic participants supporting their friends to the point where some were left without a seat. 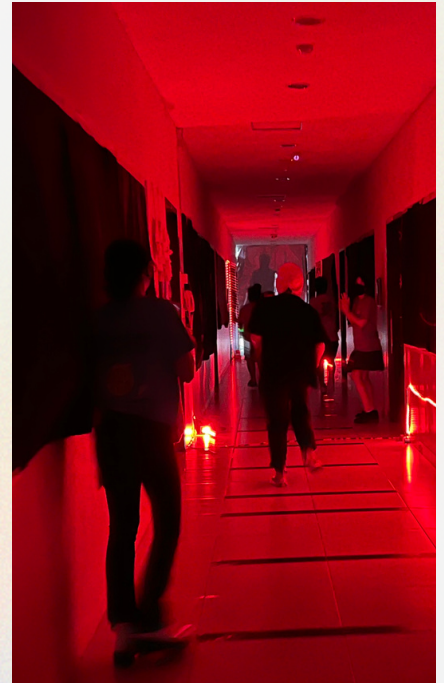
