Discovering Character Strengths

The Year 7 students underwent the Discovering Character Strengths Milestone Programme, which was held in Caldera Adventure Resort, Cikidang, Sukabumi last 16 - 18 March 2024.

This Milestone Programme was an opportunity for the Year 7 students to appreciate their personal values, discover their own character strengths and work on their weaknesses through various activities embedded in the program. The students did team building games, river rafting, flying fox and trekking through rice paddies and hillsides. They met with locals from the nearby village and learned how to weave ketupat and keris from coconut fronds. This provided them a time to reflect and pause from all the physical activities of the day.

After dinner, teacher-chaperones (Ms Abigail and Laoshi Chen) and students processed the activities. Each student was asked to find their quiet corner and write their reflection for the day.

It was truly a wonderful alternative learning experience for both the teacher-chaperones and students. Tangerang's famous and reputable Benteng Heritage Museum was such an enjoyable and interesting place, where we students were able to learn more about Indonesia's history and how Chinese ethnics impacted it.

Although the bus ride to the museum itself took us quite a while (40 minutes), we still were buzzing with anticipation, excited on what we are about to learn. As we zoomed past Jakarta and said hello to the wonderful place that is Tangerang, we were playing games and having fun in the bus.

Upon arriving to the museum, we were greeted with the market's bustling atmosphere. We walked past the colourful stalls and wonderful people selling fresh and delicate produce and food, like fish, fruits, meat, and so on. A short walk later, we stood before the museum itself, with our tour guide, a kind-hearted individual, armed with a deep knowledge of the exhibits, ready to guide us through and teach us about the ancient history of Indonesia.

We walked through a small passageway leading to our first exhibit, which was how people produced Indonesian sweet soy sauce. The sweet smell coming from the pots filled with Malika beans caught my attention, as our tour guide explained the step-by-step process on how to make it ourselves.





Next, we walked to the main spot: the museum. It was a treasure trove, filled with countless items, including mahjong puzzles, spears, ancient footwear and clothing, and scrolls of information hung on the wonderful wooden walls. Speaking of, the traditional architecture, a unique blend of Chinese and Indonesian influences, felt like it was transporting us back to the 1700's, where it was made in.

Ascending the creaky wooden stairs, we reached the second floor. Here, the air hung heavy with the weight of history. Antique photographs adorned the walls, capturing the essence of a bygone era. We saw images of community leaders, bustling markets, and architectural marvels, each frame a testament to the enduring spirit of the Chinese-Indonesian community.

The highlight of the visit was undoubtedly the attic. Sunlight streamed through the latticed windows, illuminating the ornately carved stone relief sculptures depicting scenes from the famed Chinese epic, "Sam Kok" (Three Kingdoms). Our guide explained the significance of the story, its themes of loyalty, bravery, and perseverance resonating deeply with the Chinese immigrants who sought a new life in Indonesia.

The museum exploration came to an end. Although yearning for more, we had to go to the bus back to school to resume our studies. Tired from all the walking, we felt a calming sensation when we entered the bus, combined with the fact that we now felt a profound sense of connection to the past and how it affects our lives now, as well as interesting facts about the past.

Then, they took us to an old Chinese house with Chinese writing on the walls. It was empty and lifeless, evident by the several thick layers of dust. However, it was not entirely unlived in as they say they often used the house for special events and many spiders and bugs had even made it their own home. I was pleasantly surprised to find many posters and references of old pop culture (like the Beatles poster above).

Then, they took us to the actual museum. Honestly, as the majority of us were chindos (chinese indonesians), and as a Chindo myself, I found that the information learnt resonated within me more because it was related to my own heritage. Stories and traditions passed down from my grandparents, stories and legends I heard about my predecessors that I was able to recount/get reminded of as I saw the familiar artifacts and drawings/carvings I swore I saw in my own grandparents' houses.


