YEAR 11 MILESTONE PROGRAMME (MEANING & PURPOSE)

Bhutan: A Gratifying Journey Amidst a Difficult Year

Nestled high in the eastern Himalayas, Bhutan is a small country renowned for its contentment. Despite a lack of modern technology—like traffic lights—and cows lounging in the roads, it is one of the most tranquil places we've visited. Our Y11 Milestone 'Meaning & Purpose (MAP)' trip included ten people: eight students (Catherine, Darren, Darrell, Howard, Maddison, Maxwell, Rachel, and William) and two chaperones (Ms. Nela and Mr. Dexter).

Bhutan is known for its perilous airport, where mountains loom just outside the windows. On the first day, we navigated hilly roads to reach the capital, Thimphu, at an altitude of 2,248 metres. The next day, we travelled to Punakha, stopping at historical sites like National Memorial Chhorten, Buddha Point, Dochula Pass, and Royal Takin Preserve.

We visited two schools—Jibjokha Secondary School and Khangkhu Middle Secondary School—where the NHJS community and Bhutanese children exchanged cultures for two hours. We prepared a wayang performance, taught a Congklak game, and conducted a simple science experiment. To our surprise, the children spoke fluent English, and performed their beautiful traditional dances and songs as well.

The food was euphoric, featuring abundant vegetables, imported meat, and rich butter. Their red rice was flavourful, while the silky coffee made for Darren showcased the quality of fresh beans. Ginger, widely used in drinks and snacks, was polarising; boiled, it created a spicy drink often paired with honey. The cauliflower, fried in batter and tossed in a delicious sauce, led Howard to mistake it for chicken. The fish from a local eatery was so flavourful that one person devoured an entire portion. Their local delicacy, chillicheese, was the spiciest dish we tried.

The last two days of our journey were spent trekking—a painful yet rewarding experience. Just 30 minutes in, we asked our guide, Mr. Sonam, if we had reached our campsite (we had not). Our spirits dropped when we reached the halfway point, which was at the top of another mountain. The trek was challenging; we all began to feel the thinner air, and Mr. Dexter struggled with cramps but persevered. When the campsite finally came into view at the end of the first day, we were elated, despite our exhaustion. Unfortunately, the first night and the next morning were unbearably cold, and Maddy regretted bringing AlRism jackets instead of warm ones (a message from Maddy: please bring the right jacket to Bhutan).

The second day was supposed to be all downhill, according to Mr. Sonam, but we encountered so much climbing—especially up to Tiger's Nest—that our pace slowed to a crawl (except for Darrell, Howard, and Rachel, who somehow maintained a brisk pace). Maddy's boots even gave out, forcing her to tie them back together with string. Despite the challenges, the highlight of the day was seeing Tiger's Nest, a must-see landmark in Bhutan. It did not disappoint; the intricate details inside the monastery, nestled between sheer cliffs and a vast valley, are beyond what any photo can capture.



YEAR 11 MILESTONE PROGRAMME (MEANING & PURPOSE)

After visiting Tiger's Nest, we trekked down to the parking area, carefully avoiding manure along the way. Spotting the car park from a distance stirred mixed emotions, as the end of the trek marked our last real adventure in Bhutan. Ultimately, Bhutan remains a remarkable destination for all of us. We concluded that the pain in our feet was worth every moment. Even during Year 11, a time filled with challenges, Bhutan managed to instil a sense of comfort and warmth in our hearts, making it feel like our second home.




Books Recommendation

Year 12 Field Trip to Museum Bank Indonesia



For Y12's last field trip experience this academic school year, we visited Museum Bank Indonesia located in Kota Tua, Jakarta Pusat. Kota Tua or Jakarta's Old Town was built during the Dutch colonial era.

On the 25th of September, the year 12 students went on a field trip to Museum Bank Indonesia. Our group arrived early at 8 in the morning and decided to wander around. We eventually reached Kota Tua,

where there was a group of men renting out bikes. For 30 minutes, some students rode bikes, cruising around the area while we waited to enter the museum. Others took a stroll around the park or purchased snacks and drinks in the small shops surrounding the area.

As you first enter the area you're transported to the earlier days of Indonesian history, with its grand, colonial-style building. We were all struck by its architectural masterpiece and historic ambiance.

At Museum Bank Indonesia, we were greeted by two lovely tour guides that would later guide us as we embark on Indonesia's historical financial journey. We started off with some interactive quizzes to serve as ice-breakers with some of us being able to answer them correctly and received souvenirs.

The first section of the journey was regarding the history of trade and commerce in Indonesia before independence back in the Dutch colonial days. We were all fascinated by the exhibits showcasing spices, trade routes, as well as the army uniforms and gear back in the days. The next section was dedicated to the evolution of Indonesia's monetary system and how Bank Indonesia was part of it.

One significant period highlighted was Periode 5 (1997–1998), known as "Krisis Segalalni."This was the era when Indonesia experienced an economic crisis caused by the



drastic depreciation of the rupiah from around 2,300 to 16,500 per dollar. The way the information or different trinkets were displayed piqued students' curiosity, allowing them to educate themselves on the historical information written.

Our journey continued with massive exhibits that showcased a mountain of gold bars placed in a vault that were beautifully replicated. We were also able to explore the different countries' money as well as Indonesia's monetary designs evolution.

All in all, not only we were able to gain knowledge of our own country, we all had such a fun time during this field trip to Museum Bank Indonesia. The museum did well in educating and inspiring us to appreciate the long history of Indonesia's Central Bank.


